The International Year of Astronomy

You have probably read by now that 2009 has been designated as The International Year of Astronomy by the International Astronomical Union (IAU). It has also been endorsed by UNESCO and the UN General Assembly. The IAU picked 2009 for the event to mark the 400th anniversary of Galileo's first telescope observations. This is a global event with an emphasis on education, pubic encouragement and youth involvement. Thousands of people in more than 125 countries and 50 organizations around the world are already involved.

This is truly an international collaboration with participants from nearly every country on Earth, all with one objective -- to expose as many as possible of the world's 6.8 billion people to the wonders of the universe.

So what can we do? What are you going to do? At our club level we are continuing our public outreaches in conjunction with the museum and with local schools. Individually we can be "sidewalk astronomers" setting up our scopes in our front yards or driveways and called passer-bys to come see the Moon, a star cluster, a galaxy or even the Sun. You can answer their questions about telescopes, eye pieces, what it takes to get started... and you can invite them to come to one of our club meetings. You can be the inspiration for some young person who just might become the next George Ellery Hale.

This is an ambitious project that will, in a time of adversity and conflict, bring people together. Every culture on Earth has marveled at the Sun, Moon and stars. For as long as humans have walked the Earth, we have looked up at the night sky and wondered about what we saw. The allure of discovery continues.
